

Initiatives for Just Communities is a non-profit organization that is committed to restorative justice practices. IJC works to create communities where each person, particularly the stigmatized and the vulnerable, has a place to belong.

We walk with people with Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder and intellectual disabilities, and those currently or previously incarcerated, to help them to achieve a better quality of life for themselves and their communities.

Circles of Support & Accountability



CoSA supports individuals in Winnipeg with sexual offense histories who are integrating into the community after incarceration or serving probation or parole.

El'dad



El'dad supports adults with intellectual disabilities in the Eastman region. El'dad's programs include Residential, Home Share, Supported Cluster, Outreach, Day Program, Drop-In and an Alternative Justice Program.

Open Circle



Open Circle is a prison visitation program that matches trained volunteers with participants. Open Circle provides nonjudgmental support and long-term connection.

Touchstone



Touchstone supports adults with intellectual disabilities in Winnipeg. Touchstone's programs include Outreach, Supported Cluster, and Drop-In.

Visions & Voices (program of Touchstone)



Visions & Voices is a speakers' bureau comprised of adults with Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder. V&V uses storytelling to raise awareness, reduce stigma, and increase dignity for those living with FASD.

VISIT FROM MINISTER FONTAINE

Approximately 60 participants, staff and board members welcomed Family Services Minister Nahanni Fontaine to El'dad Ranch on April 1.

It was an afternoon of story sharing, touring the sweat lodge, and gathering around good food and a sacred fire. The Minister heard from IJC's Participant Advisory Committee and Tim Barron Jr. shared a drum song.

Janet Plenert, Board Chair of MCC Manitoba, honoured the Minister with an MCC quilt, and IJC participants, Holly and Liz, presented the Minister with a traditional star blanket.



In February, IJC and seven other agencies from the Eastman region met with Minister Fontaine to discuss funding concerns and the need for clinical and specialized services for participants. Minister Fontaine's visit to El'dad Ranch provided an opportunity to gain firsthand insight into IJC's programming and needs.





IJC HONOURED BY CABINET MINISTER

On April 15, 2025, the Honourable Nahanni Fontaine acknowledged IJC in front of the Manitoba Legislative Assembly. A team of IJC staff and participants were at the Legislature to receive the Minister's statement:

"A couple of weeks ago, our Families team had the incredible privilege of visiting Initiatives for Just Communities' El'dad Ranch, a truly remarkable place changing lives every single day by supporting Manitobans with intellectual disabilities.

IJC LEADERS ENROLL AT THE U OF M

This spring, ten IJC Managers and Coordinators enrolled in management and counselling courses at the University of Manitoba's Extended Education.



We asked Angela Godlewski about her experience studying at the U of M.

What is your role at IJC and how long have you been with the organization? Could you summarize some of the work you do?

I am the Senior Manager of Operations at IJC. I have been with IJC for 7.5 years. In my role, I oversee office operations, vehicles, maintenance, and IT. I strive to keep the office running smoothly in the day-to-day operations as well as provide guidance in office processes and find efficiencies and cost savings along the way.

What course(s) are you taking through the University of Manitoba?

I am currently enrolled in "Organizational Behaviour."

Why did you decide to enroll in these studies?

It was a pretty easy decision to make. It seemed like a great opportunity to learn more about what is happening at the heart of an organization, and to identify how we can further expand on the success we are seeing at IJC with the knowledge learned through this course.

What parts of the course content are you finding most interesting and relevant to your work?

I have found it has been interesting to explore the many different theories about organizational behaviour (there are a lot!). One of the most recent topics we explored was motivation, which is an important aspect of both our work and home lives. It has brought insight on what may impact motivation, both positively and negatively, and how we can work to isolate concerns and navigate forward.



What are you enjoying about the course so far? What are you finding challenging or surprising?

Learning ways to continue to grow and develop in areas such as teamwork, communication and leadership has been enjoyable! It has been challenging to balance work, home and school at times; however, there is a lot of support from colleagues also taking this course. Its been a pleasure to explore the course material with my colleagues and support one another in this venture.

Ingredients


- 10 tablespoons (145g) unsalted butter
- 1 1/4 cups (250g) granulated sugar
- 3/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons (75g) unsweetened cocoa powder, spooned and leveled
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/4 teaspoon fine sea salt
- 2 large cold eggs
- 1/2 cup (65g) all-purpose flour, spooned and leveled
- 2/3 cup (80g) chopped walnuts, pecans, or chocolate chips, optional

PERFECT FUDGY BROWNIES

Instructions

1. Heat oven to 325°F (162°C). Line bottom and sides of an 8-inch square baking pan with parchment paper or aluminum foil, leaving an overhang on opposite sides.
2. Add butter to a medium saucepan. Place over medium-low heat and cook until butter melts completely, then turn off the heat. Stay close, and do not let it brown.
3. While butter is hot, stir in the sugar, cocoa powder, vanilla, and salt. Stir well until blended. Don't worry if batter looks gritty. Once you add the eggs, the batter will become smooth.
4. Set the saucepan aside to cool until the mixture is warm, not hot, 5-10 minutes.
5. Add cold eggs, one at a time, stirring vigorously after each egg.
6. When batter is thick and well blended, add flour. Use a spoon to beat the flour into the batter until very thick and it pulls away from the sides of the bowl.
7. Stir in nuts or chocolate chips (optional).
8. Spread brownie batter evenly in prepared pan. It can be hard to spread because it is so thick.
9. Bake brownies until edges look dry and the middle is slightly underbaked, 20-30 minutes. A toothpick in the center should emerge somewhat moist with batter.
10. Cool completely before removing the brownies from the pan. For guaranteed perfect edges, chill the brownies in the fridge for 1 to 2 hours before slicing.




